The 16th yellow tee is to become a par 5 on recommendation from the Comps Committee. Greens we will be adding a sign describing priority for 16th hole

when playing 15th (such as 6/7)

Please keep your eyes peeled on the notice board as it will be used to inform members of any forthcoming disruptive works.

Volunteers will be using the newly purchased electric carryall buggy for divotting and rabbit-hole filling, tee repairing etc.

The 8mm pencil tining of the greens has been completed. Minor disruption has been rolled and has settled the surface satisfactorily.

A new trolley/buggy park and path sub-base for the 10th tee has been completed with final surface to be added once the sub-base has firmed sufficiently.

Irrigation pipes/addition for the 10th and 14th fringes have been installed. The turf, although high at the moment, will be rolled/tracked and it is anticipated to settle to the correct level in time. Grass cover on both these fringe areas will now improve, both helping players with sometimes extremely tight bare lies and enhancing course presentation.

Solid tining will continue on fairways with overseeding work scheduled for the week, starting on March 18th. 2, 3, 5, 11, 12, 16 and 17 are the main targets for this operation.

The rabbit fence on the 11th will be extended, as far as the wartime pillbox at this stage and signs posted at the other end, pointing pedestrians to the coastal path.

Rabbit numbers are reducing with the introduction of the fence at the 9th, 10th, and 11th tee area. A special thanks to Adam Hewett, who has been regularly shooting/ferreting and is keeping the whole site under control. The damage on the 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th holes will be filled with soil/seed shortly, but it is expected some scraping will continue. The warren in front of the 11th tee will be collapsed in conjunction with reinstatement of the old path back to rough, which will allow us to monitor rabbit activity. The completion of the rabbit fence will also help control this warren.

Ian Gover Handicap & Competitions

One of the glories of golf is that it has a handicap system - people of differing abilities can play each other in a fair system. Many people will argue about the word 'fair' as no system can truly

reflect the ability of a player on a day.

People have different ideas about handicaps with Wikipedia stating that: - 'A golf handicap is a numerical measure of a golfer's potential ability'. The keyword here is potential. A handicap is the value that if everything was going well you would achieve, not what you will play to every round.

I would always encourage players whether they are elite, improvers, steady or declining golfers to make sure that they play at least 4 qualifying rounds a year to make sure that their handicap is a reflection of their current potential especially as we approach 2020 when the new handicap system is going to be introduced.

Some situations suit players with a high handicap, others with a low handicap. In whatever game you are playing what you should be doing is enjoying it, having fun, relishing the good play of your opponent and only silently cursing their handicap under your breath.

As for the new rules, there have been several well publicised issues in the professional game with LI Haotong being penalised for his caddy standing behind him to line him up. This rule also applies to us, it could be a penalty if someone stands behind you when you take the stance for a shot. I would avoid standing behind any player even if you are trying to help by watching the ball into the sun. Stand to one side to avoid any issues.

Last month I asked for options if you were in a dog's paw print in a bunker. You are now allowed free relief for any animal impression, it no longer has to be a burrowing animal. You could of course take the ball out of the bunker and take 2 penalty shots!

This month – what should happen if a player putts up to the flag and then in trying to hole out quickly hits it against the flag pole, bounces back onto his putter and then rebounds into the hole?
