One of the last proprietors of the Clwt Militia mine was a Joseph Field from Surrey who, on the 7th of September 1891, paid the previous owner of the mining rights and equipment (interestingly, the Rector of Brynford who had bought a 21 year lease from the Marquess of Westminster in 1874!) £5,000 for 3 year's rights along with one year's rights to other local lead mines. A royalty of £0-15-0/Ton of lead ore was also to be paid.

The Perchaser shall formand pay all the preliminary expenses of the formation of the said internet dimpany and shall internity the bender against all claims and proceedings mespeet thereof. The sale shall be completed within four kendarys of the allohoust of shares of the said internet formpany when the bender shall duly hansfer the scheduled premises to the Company or its nominees and the Catificates to the title of the said shares shall be handed over to the bender when possession of the scheduled premises shall be given h the limbary.

Limestone Quarrying on Holywell Golf Course



Two limestone quarries, the Clwt Militia quarries, of post medieval origin as they were old when this 1871 map was drawn up, underlie all of the present 2nd and most of the present 8th fairways. Prior to the quarries being filled in in the 80s, the track sloping down through a cutting into the quarry was a severe hazard when playing towards what is now the 8th green. For a really big slice off the tee or from a second shot, so was the quarry itself! In Brynford in the 19th century, a royalty of 2d per ton of limestone was paid by the Pantlle quarry (1/4 mile south of the present 16th green) owners to the Duke of Westminster.

More limestone quarries, also of post medieval origin as they were old when this 1910 map was drawn up, lie to the right of the 14th and have to be played over when playing the 15th and 16th.

There were also two sand and gravel pits, one just in front of the 15th tee and the other to the right of the 17th fairway.
