News from the course with Andy Grabham

The cold weather has arrived and the leaves are falling!! Winter is on the horizon with white frosts already upon us.

Apart from a 4 day period which brought 2" of rain and strong winds from storm Callum, it's stayed quite dry still and mild which has helped with grass recovery, especially the greens.

The greens are disease free and have pretty much recovered from scaring. The tining work (pictured), verti-cutting and chemicals applications carried out on them over the past month have payed off.

We now have a healthy and strong sword heading into the colder months, the constant battle is to keep them that way!!

We will continue to keep the canopy open as much as possible, with aeration practices and raising the height of cut to 5mm to help protect the crowns of the plant. More rolling and less cutting will be the plan going forward.

With leaves falling thick and fast we will do our best to keep up with blowing and collecting them as much as possible. Please accept we can't clear them from all areas every day!

With grass growth rate slowing down and recovery rates, the summer markers have been brought in for refurbishment and to help the tees recover for next season. Please only tee off from winter yellow or red tee markers. The 5th, 10th & 13th will now be off the winter mats, not because its too wet but to help the tees recover for next season. Others will change to mats when conditions change. The Manor course will change to mats in the coming weeks for the same reasons.

The height of cut on tees and aprons have now been brought up to 14mm, this helps protect the plant front the colder conditions and aids to increase photosynthesis. The time of year has come for us to start protecting areas from traffic wear and thin areas! Ropes/ hoops and signage will be put out over the next month to help combat this(sorry for the extra few yards you have to walk on your way around). Can I ask until buggies go to pathways full time, that when there is a frost, can you keep buggies on paths to stop black burn lines on the grass.


For those early golfers, especially who tee off before the first allocated tee time or from the 10th , 6th or any other tee, please remember that Greenkeepers have right of way in the mornings especially!! We try our best to keep out of your way and to get ahead of play, but its not always possible. We don't appreciated you hitting towards us unless we call you through. you wouldn't hit if there was another golfer there, so why do you hit at us!!

I have received the soil tests back from the US. The results are encouraging and positive even after a tough summer. A long way to go but we are heading in the right direction. With a few changes required to the program and ratio inputs tweaked, i am positive we can continue to improve the greens year by year. One of the Major projects set for the winter is the redesign of the tees on our feature hole the 12th (pictured). We hope to create a computer image of our planned works to help you see our vision.

We hope to start these works soon so we can get them in play early next season. Thanks

8th/17th tree

Sadly, we have now lost both branches to the iconic tree on the 8th/17th island. We have several ideas on what we will do with the tree. From growing creepers up the stump to getting a carving done to a completely new planting. It is on the list of jobs and we will keep you posted. Thanks to all members for their suggestions.

16th Hole

The owners of North Lawn (the house to the left of the 16th hole) have indicated that they may apply for a 'Public Nuisance' order to be issued against us if balls don't stop crossing their boundary.

We will endeavour to reduce the risk of stray golf balls through a number of measures (see below). Most of the measures will not detract too much from this popular hole. However, the most regrettable step will be to remove the oak tree in the middle of the fairway to enable us to push the fairway away from North Lawn and also to stop players being blocked out and being forced to go left of the tree.

Whilst we know there are many opinions on this, we are doing the neighbourly thing by attempting to address their concerns and frustrations.

- 1. Six 15 foot trees to act as a block to stop any drives heading left. (Smaller trees to be planted to fill out the area behind the tree screen for future growth.)
- 2. Six 15 foot trees to further cover any shots heading left. (Smaller trees to be planted to fill out the area behind the tree screen for future growth.)
- 3. Ten x 12 foot trees to fill out/screen the left hand area.
- 4. Fence with netting to be erected here.
- 5. Oak tree to be removed.
- 6. 18 foot tree to be positioned on the corner of dogleg to push players to the right.
- 7. Base of hedge and scrub to be cleared out to encourage players to stay to the right.
- 8. Yellow and green tees to be moved further back and tee widened to the left to force players to the right.
- 9. Marker Post

DO YOU WANT 10 YARDS EXTRA?

I'm sure everyone wants a few more yards on their shots however most golfers try to achieve this in the wrong way. Swing speed is the element that most of us associate with hitting the golf further however when we try to increase this all control is lost. The 2 key areas that will gain you more distance but help you to maintain control if not improve it are as follows:

Launch Angle

This represents the initial elevation angle of the golf ball in relation to the ground immediately after impact.

Spin rate (back spin)

The spin rate pertains to the amount of backspin of the golf ball upon immediate impact. Take a look at the chart opposite and compare the results, you can see that Tiger and Bubba's swing speed are the same however Bubba's hit it 58 yards longer. This massive gain in distance is all down to the spin rate and launch angle and NOT swing speed.

To get those 10 extra yards come and see me!!

Tiger Woods Clubhead Speed – 125 mph Launch Angle - 11° Spin Rate - 2200 rpm Average Distance - 302 yards

Bubba Watson Clubhead Speed - 125 mph Launch Angle - 15.5°-17° Spin Rate - 1865 rpm (super low!) Carry Distance - 350 yards

Check Your Shoulders First!

Ever struck the most amazing shot only to look up and see it going in completely the wrong direction? The first place most amateur golfers check are their feet alignment. Try checking your shoulder alignment first as this has a far greater effect on the line of the swing than your feet. Ball position can play a big part in causing your shoulders to be incorrectly aligned. Use tour sticks to happy check your ball position, see picture below. If you don't have any call into the shop we always have them in stock.

Saturday Stableford 27/10/2018

In difficult conditions the final weekends golf of playing off the white tees with all golfers looking forward to waterproofs and woolly hats. In Division 1 it was tight at the top with two players on 37 points with Dan Raisbeck taking the honours on countback from Matt Horler and Paul Broadway third on 35 points. The round of the day from John Marquiss topped Division 2 with a fantastic 44 points. A big cut in handicap is on its way. Two Payers topped Division 2 on 35 points with Nick Russell in 1st place beating Joe Cox on countback with Paul Jones third on 34 points.

Ladies

The fine autumn weather continues, extending the golfing season after the poor weather start to the golfing year. The "Saturday Ladies" enjoyed fine sunny weather on 29th September, but most found it difficult to score well. Jackie Walker, Clare Salter & Sue Forshaw had two spot birdies.

Gail Proctor scored 36 points to win Division 1, ahead of Clare Salter (34) and Jackie Walker, who beat Paula Chivers on count back after both scored 32 points. In Division 2, Kay Clarke found form with 36 points, 3 ahead of Sue Forshaw. Gail & Kay earned handicap reductions, due to the CSS rising by one to 74.

Similar conditions prevailed on Thursday, 4th October, with 40 ladies in the field, scores ranged from 36 points to mid-teens. June Symonds had two birdies at the par 3 10th & 15th. Min Woodward had a birdie at 15th as well. Division 1 scores were tight at the top with count back in operation to sort out the placing. Pauline Young continued her good form of recent weeks, scoring 36 points, beating Lo Dallocco on count back. Three players scored 35 points; Fiona Hassard took third place on count back, edging out Carol Jones and Wendy Butt. Division 2 had a similar story; Jill Holland's better score on the back 9 holes, edged Mary Hobbs into second place after both scored 34 points. Denise Baker was third with 33 points, beating Debbie Jones on count back. The nice autumn weather was perfect for a medal competition and the best turnout of lady players for several years, vied for the Trophy. A birdie at the par 4 fourth hole and six pars in her round of gross 85, net 72, ensured Lena Warren was the champion, earning herself a handicap cut. Second place with a gross 89, net 74 was Gail Proctor. Lin Papadopoullos was third; Clare Salter had the only two spot birdie of the day at the par 3 fifth hole.






Dropping Procedure

Reference Point

The point from which the size of relief area is measured.

Relief Area

• The area where a player must drop a ball when taking relief under a Rule.





New Principles

Dropping Procedure

Club Length

- Defined as the length of the longest club the player has during the round, other than the putter.
- Used to define the player's teeing area on each hole and in determining the size of the player's relief area when taking relief under a rule.
- Whilst other clubs (other than the putter) can be used we recommend using the longest club at all times.

New Principles

Dropping Procedure

Knee Height

- Must be dropped from knee height.
- Must be dropped straight down without touching player or equipment before hitting ground.
- Must be dropped in Relief Area.

Note: 'Knee height' means the height of a players knee when in a standing position.



New Principles

Ball searching

 Time for ball search reduced to 3 minutes.



- No penalty if a player causes the ball to moved during search. The ball will always be replaced, even if its original spot is not known.
- Not longer required to announce intention to lift a ball for identification purposes

New Principles

Substituted Ball

• Whenever taking relief, a player may use either the original ball or another ball.

Striking the Ball more than once/ Accidental deflections

• Count the stroke and there is no penalty.

Damaged Clubs

No matter what the nature or cause of the damage:

- club treated as conforming for the rest of the round
- player may continue with the damaged club, or
- have the club repaired

Even if video evidence shows error.

Distance Measuring Devices


Now permitted within the rules.

Caddie assistance

 Not permitted to assist in alignment. Penalty if still behind player when player takes stance.

Areas of the Course – General Area

The area of the course that covers all of the course except for the four other defined areas:

- 1. The teeing area
- 2. All penalty areas
- 3. All bunkers
- 4. The putting green of the hole being played

The general area includes:

- All teeing locations on the course other than the teeing area, and
- All wrong greens



Areas of the Course – General Area



Ball is embedded

Part of the ball (embedded in its own pitch-mark) is below the level of the ground.

— Level of Ground




Ball is embedded

Despite the fact that the ball is not touching the soil, part of the ball (embedded in its own pitch-mark) is below the level of the ground.




Ball is NOT embedded

Even though the ball is sitting down in the grass, relief is not available because no part of the ball is below the level of the ground.





Rule 12


Bunkers are one of the 5 defined areas of the course.

- A player may now remove loose impediments (leaves, branches, sticks etc) from a bunker.
- But is <u>not</u> permitted to ground the club.



Areas of the Course – Putting Green

Improvements allowed

- Whether ball lies on or off green
- Repair of damage caused by a person or outside influence permitted

Improvements not allowed

 But not natural damage or damage caused by normal maintenance practices







Areas of the Course – Putting Green

Flagstick Left in the Hole

- The player may make a stroke with the flagstick left in the hole.
- No penalty if ball strikes flagstick.

When Ball is Holed

 If any part of the ball is in the hole below the surface of the putting green.







Areas of the Course – Putting Green

Replacing ball or ball marker that moves

- Whenever moved accidentally
- Whenever moved by natural forces, after ball marked, lifted and replaced
- No penalty


Caddies' new authority

- Lifting ball on putting green without authorisation
- Touching line of play (player or caddie)

Areas of the Course – Penalty Areas

Rule 17

A penalty area is:

- 1. Any body of water on the course including a sea, lake, pond, river ditch, surface draining ditch or other open watercourse (even if not containing water)
- Any other part of the course the Committee defines as a penalty area. Two types of penalty area, Yellow and Red. May remove loose impediments. May ground the club.

Areas of the Course - No Play Zones

A part of the course where the Committee has prohibited play. A No Play Zone must be defined as part of either an abnormal course condition or a penalty area.

These may be used for any reason, such as:

- Protecting wildlife, animal habitats and environmentally sensitive areas
- Protection of young trees, flower beds, re-turfed areas
- Protecting players from danger
- Preserving sites of historical or cultural interest ENGLANDGOLF

So, what's new?

In 2019, players will continue to drop a ball when taking relief, but the dropping procedure will be changed in several ways:

- The ball must be let go from knee height so that it falls through the air
- The focus of the dropping procedure will be to drop the ball in a specific "relief area"
- No re-drop is required if the dropped ball accidentally hits a person or object after

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
