Dynamic Risk Assessment

Individual members of staff should carry out a dynamic risk assessment. This should reflect any information such as relevant problems encountered by staff situation etc. Whilst this may be carried out informally, any significant aspects must be recorded in the job notes or other appropriate secure format and reported to the Line manager at the earliest opportunity. Specific risk assessments should be carried out for unusual or short-term lone working activities. The principles identified in the generic assessment can be applied for this type of risk assessment.

Dynamic Risk assessment for Lone Working

1.	Does anybody know where you are lone working and how long you will be?	
2.	Are arrangements in place for someone to initiate action if you do not respond to check visits or calls or	
	report completion at the agreed time?	
3.	If your appointment programme changes have you informed the person who would initiate such action?	
4.	Have you made sure that you can be contacted?	
5.	Can you summon assistance and are arrangements made to enable specified persons to attend promptly?	
6.	Can you safely get to your work area and return to your car if say working late or attending on-call?	
7.	Have you avoided or minimised the carrying of cash and having valuable items visible?	
8.	Are you prepared to seek advice, get support or terminate the task as appropriate if there is any aspect that makes you uneasy?	
9.	Will you pass on to colleagues at the first opportunity on any aspects of the task that need to be shared?	
10	Do you carry a personal phone?	
11	. Are you manual handling risks insignificant or covered by existing manual handling assessments
