### Fly-over Footage Coming Soon

Scott Mahaffy and Paul Rickerby worked closely with the team who took the videos in early May, and Bob Charlton is currently producing the finished product.

## **Greens Update July 2024**

Greens have come on a great deal in the last few weeks, trueness and speed has improved with regular verti-cutting and applications of Attraxor: a growth regulator which diverts the growth hormones and redirects it to root establishment and growth rather than the top growth giving us a healthier sward without excessive top growth making it difficult to achieve speed.

We are also applying wetting agent, seaweed, Amino and humic acids on a monthly basis and wetting agent on tees monthly. Selective weed killer has been applied to the tees and the worst fairways will be done in the coming weeks.

We have dyna-cored the greens with solid 9mm tines once however with the surface sealing being so hard we aren't getting the depth required to properly alleviate this problem. After golf week is finished, I am planning on getting a demo of a sarel roller to test on the greens which will give us better depth and give us an idea of whether a sarel roller would be worth owning as a quick and minimally disruptive machine to treat the surface sealing.

With help from volunteers the greens have been aerated with the air2g2 to a depth of 12 inches to keep on top of deep compaction this will be carried out again at the end of the season.

The New fairway mower has been out for a few weeks now and is performing well and the quality of the fairways has noticeably improved. The old fairway mower has been demoted to the practice field where we are slowly lowering the height with the intention to eventually have the field cut at fairway height (15mm) which will help the ball picker perform better and improve the presentation of the field.

The un-cut rough has been a problem this year with the perfect storm of weather for grass growing and is longer than ever. Following a meeting with the greens committee we have agreed to grow in some strips of the semi rough where it meets the un-cut rough to slow balls down before they reach the un-cut rough. Once the season has finished, we will begin a rough management programme utilising the Amazone flail mower and terrarake to top off and thin out areas of the rough and allow it to grow back thinner and whispier for the following season. More information will follow in the winter work programme.

## **Solar Progress after Two Years**

Our solar power installation has been the biggest investment made by the Club for decades. With Electricity costs being such a major and increasing expenditure, anything we could do to reduce that cost had to be taken seriously. The proposal put to the membership in Spring 2022 forecast a potential reduction in consumption of 25% and a likely return on expenditure of seven years. With a 20+ year lifetime on the installation we could look forward after that to 25% of our electricity being free.

We have maintained a good record of our electricity consumption over the last decade (see the table). After a year of solar operation, we were seeing not a 25% reduction but nearer to 35%. Now, after two years we are seeing this reduction holding steady and with last year's installation of batteries a further reduction. In fact, our calculation in the 2022 proposal was based on our full year consumption for 2018/19 which had reached over 102,000 kWh. That year was our most successful business-wise with a heavy programme of activities throughout the year. The following two years were the pandemic years where long periods of lockdown and restrictions meant considerably less electricity used. By 2021/22 we were emerging from the pandemic and climbing back to a better level of business activity.

The first year of solar reduced our consumption to 53,665 kWh and we estimate our second year to be slightly less again. Compared with 2018/19 (the busiest year) we are using nearly 50% less electricity, and compared with the pandemic recovery year we are using about 40% less. We won't let it rest there and we are looking at even more efficiencies in our energy use. In money terms the 33,000 kWh yearly saving over the last two years reduced our costs by about £20,000.

Our thanks go to the original project team and to Rodger Temple who is taking an active interest in getting the best from our investment.

# Macca's Cup 2024

Members and visitors alike turned out in great numbers for the annual Macca's Cup, a four-person team event that honours the long-time friend to many, Ian McDonald. After some early morning rain, the conditions turned favourable for the late starters. Winners with a score 112 were Ken Benn (Whitehaven), Billy Dickenson (Whitehaven), Wes Benn (Seascale) and Mark Lee (Seascale) beating the all-Seascale team of Mark Harris, Liam Towers, Chris Madden and Mathew Garrat by one point. The final prize went to David Boyce (Silecroft), David McCrum, Peter Warren and John Simpson, all Seascale with 107pts. The competition raised £1,350 for the Captain's Charity (West Cumbria Hospice) and £150 was donated to the Whitehaven RNIB.

# **Prostate Cancer UK Big Golf Challenge 2024**

Last year Graham Begbie led a team of 8 in a charity event for Prostate Cancer involving 2 rounds of golf (half marathon) as part of the Big Golf Challenge run by Prostate Cancer UK. They managed to raise over £1300 - a great success.

On Friday 7<sup>th</sup> June this year with 3 tees booked they set off at 7.45 by special agreement with the greens staff to repeat or better that achievement, and although the weather on the second 18 holes wasn't very kind, they plugged on regardless.

By 8<sup>th</sup> June they had raised approximately £1100 with every likelihood of exceeding last year's total and raising between £2,500 and £3,000 for prostate cancer UK over the two years.

Graham extended the thanks of the team to Seascale Golf Club, Adam, Kirsty, the green keepers and bar staff for all their help and support. And I'm sure all members would wish to thank Graham for another great effort.

### **Ladies Taster Days**

His course record at Seascale was in July 1905. We have not found any record yet in our archives, but we are indebted to Tom and his friend for shining a light on Seascale's golfing greatness when Open Champion winners made a b-line for our hallowed links.
