Terms of Competition

Updated July 2023 – S R Lamb, Competition Secretary

1) Introduction

This document outlines guidance and rules for running of Competitions and Handicaps at Elland Golf Club. The Competition rules are written down to bring together in one document the way that Club Competitions will be organised and run by the Committee and organised by the Competition Secretary in order to ensure consistency in the application of these rules. The document sets out the role of the Committee and Competition Secretary and the penalties for any breaches of the rules. All players must adhere to the Competition rules which will lead to a high level of fair play, player etiquette and competitiveness. The Committee will follow the guidelines of the current 2023 R & A Rules of Golf to ensure the 'Committee Procedures' are followed to allow fair play for all playing members in a competition and socially.

2) Rules

- a) All Competitions will be played according to the Rules of Golf, as approved by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St Andrews
- b) Club Competitions will be run in accordance with the Rules of Competition
- c) All Local Rules are those applicable to the Elland Golf Club Course and will be approved by the Committee of Elland Golf Club.
- d) All rules will be applied with fairness and the Committee's decision will be final. In making any decision the Committee and the Competition Secretary, will endeavour to be consistent and ensure fairness to all Competitors.
- e) These rules supersede all previous rules of the Elland Golf Club and future changes will be made as amendments to this document, following approval of the full Committee of Elland Golf Club.
- f) **Starting** All Competitors will commence Competition play from the 1st tee unless notified by the Competition Secretary that they should start elsewhere.
- g) **Teeing Ground** All Competitions will be played from the White Medal tees unless otherwise stated (players may only play from White Medal tees in Competitions approved by the Competition Secretary and/or the Committee. The Competition Secretary will note which tees will be used for each Competition on the entry sheet.
- h) **Time of Starting** Players will tee off at the time indicated on the entry/draw sheet. The Competition Secretary may permit a player/s to change their tee off time depending on the reason for the change and the practicality of adjusting the entry/draw sheet. Competitors who arrive late for their tee off time may be penalised, two strokes at the first hole in Stroke play and loss of first hole in Match play.

3) Entry and Draw Procedure

- a) Only full playing members of Elland Golf Club will be able to enter club competitions (the exception being Mid Week Stableford competitions which are also open to Country Members). Players must have a WHS® Handicap Index with a minimum of 3 Competition qualifying scores recorded from a competition round in the last 12 months. Players who have not had 3 qualifying scores recorded will be eligible to play in the competition but will not be eligible to win a prize.
- b) Each Competitor should book a tee time by using the PSI terminal located in the lounge or via the Club Systems V1 Members Hub. For individual competitions each member can only book themselves in due to the high demand for slots in the middle block of tee times. For Team competitions each member can book themselves and up 3 other members into the same team. Competitors may also in the event, of being unable to attend and enter their name on the PSI due to illness or holidays, contact the Competition Secretary who will enter their name on their behalf. The contact should be no later than 2 days prior to the start of the Competition.
- c) If a player becomes unable to participate in the Competition, they must remove their name from the Competition Entry Sheet using the PSI or Club Systems V1 Members Hub as soon as possible.
- d) Where a draw is to be made, this will be made by either the Club Professional/Competition Secretary or a member of the Committee on the date notified on the entry sheet.
- e) Where a draw is made before the day of the Competition, it will be posted on the Competition notice board.
- f) No alteration to any draw may be made by a Competitor/s without the agreement of the Club Professional/Competition Secretary or a member of the Committee.
- g) Late entries will be approved by the Club Professional/Competition Secretary or the member of the Committee organising the Competition on the day and will only be allowed where it is practical to accommodate them without detriment to Competitors who have made entry on time.
- h) Competitors who cannot make their entry time must notify the Club Professional/Competition Secretary or a member of the Committee. Members who persistently fail to turn up for competitions that they have entered will be banned for a minimum of 2 weeks or longer as decided by the Committee.
- i) In Competitions where there is a draw for partners, no late entries will be allowed.
- j) The draw will be made by the Club Professional/Competition Secretary or a member of the Committee at the time notified on the entry sheet. This will be done by either electronically random name selection or selection of a numbered disc corresponding to a name on the entry sheet.
- k) The Competition Secretary or Member of the Committee in the Competition Secretary's absence is empowered to adjust the draw to allow members to tee off prior to the first time on the competition sheet, in order to facilitate the supervision of the clubhouse and the administration of the competition and for other bona fide reasons accepted by the Competition Secretary
- The Competition Entry Sheet will be posted on the PSI and the Club Systems V1 Members Hub on the internet, 13 days prior to the Competition been played at 21.00 hours. In the event of a cancelled fixture, a re-arranged fixture will be played on the first available Saturday or Sunday after the cancelled date. In some cases only 7/8 days' notice will be given. This applies to all Competitions including Medals which may have to be played on a Sunday due to the shortage of available free days.
- m) Singles Competitions should, where possible, be played in 3 balls.

4) Signing In / Intention to Play

Competitors must indicate an intention to play in all Competitions. In Stroke Play this will be by signing in on the computer or via ClubV1 Members App before commencing play. Failure to do so will result in disqualification from the Competition. In Fourball Matchplay, when a draw is made, Competitors will be informed whether to sign in on the computer or by a member of the Competition Organising Committee/Club Professional who will sign each team in on their behalf to allow play to commence, In Fourball Betterball, Competitors may be required to form their own team on the computer if instructed to do so. This must be carried out before commencement of play.

5) Entry Fees

All entry fees must be paid before start of play of each Competition. The entry fee will be automatically taken from the members "Competition Account" at the time of booking or at time of sign in. If a player withdraws from a competition at least 44 hour before the commencment of the competition their Competition Account will be credited. If a member withdraws their booking later than 44 hours prior to the commencement of the competition then then at the discretion of the Competition Secretary the entry fee will be charged irrespective of whether the charge was to be taken at sign in or booking. In Knockout Competitions members must pay before the 1st round commences or the due date displayed on the Competition Entry Form.

6) **Prizes**

- a) All individual prizes for winners and division winners will be awarded after completion of each competition and are set out in the Competition Section. Where multiple prizes (except for Nearest the Pin or Longest Drive) are won by the same individual in a competition, then the prize with the greatest value will be awarded and the next on the list will be awarded the other prize.
- b) All Trophy prizes will be awarded at a prize presentation dinner, at which, all prize winners should make every effort to attend and receive their Trophies.
- c) All winners prize money will be administered to the winner by the Competition Secretary or the Professional. Prize money can be redeemed with the Professional or credited onto their Bar or Competitions Account.

7) Knockout Competitions

- a) The Competitions played as an Individual knockout format are: Holroyd Bowl, Ingham Bowl, Rabbits Lumb Trophy and David Thomas Tigers Trophy. The competitions played as a paired knockout format are Dyson-Smith Trophies and Centenary Greensomes
- b) Competitors can enter a knockout using the PSI in the lounge or via the Club Systems V1 Members Hub on the internet. The Competition Secretary and one other member of the competition SubCommittee will make the knockout draw using the computer towards the end of March. The knockout competitions commence on 1st April. Deadline dates will be staggered. Holroyd Bowl to be completed by first Monday in the month, Ingham bowl to be completed by the second Monday in the month and Dyson Smith to be completed by the third Monday in the month. Six weeks will be allowed for the first round, five weeks for the second round, four weeks for the third round, three weeks for the semi-final and three weeks for the final. All knockouts must be completed by the end of September but please be aware that the Greenkeepers work of hollow tining greens which normally starts in the first week of September. A date in the diary will be kept free for finals to be played usually the last Sunday in September.
- c) Only full members of Elland Golf Club can enter. Players must have a WHS® Handicap Index with a minimum of 3 Competition qualifying scores recorded in the last 12 months from competition rounds. Maximum Course Handicap limit of 28.0.
- d) All names and entry fees must be paid and submitted before the last day of March. Names of entrants who have not paid entry fees will not be included in the draw.
- e) In the Dyson Smith pairs knockout substitution of a partner will only be allowed for the preliminary/1st Round match as long as the pair have not played already and the player being substituted in as not also already played in a previous round.

Arranging matches

a) Players must make contact with their opponent as soon as possible offering three dates to play the tie, one of which must be a weekend. Once the tie has been completed the result should be recorded as soon as possible via the PSI in the clubhouse or via Club Systems Members hub so that the result is visible and future matches can be planned as soon as possible.

- b) Where players are unable to make an arrangement to play between themselves, they will notify the Competition Secretary who will set out a date and time for the tie to be played. Should one of the players fail to be on the tee at the specified date and time and the other one is present, the player who is present will be the winner of the match
- c) Where the tie is not played by the due date, unless, in the opinion of the Competition Secretary the tie has not been played because of the actions of one of the players the Competition Secretary will disqualify both players
- d) Limited extensions will only be granted in the case of illness, bereavement, course closure or Jury Service

Knockout Match Rules

- a) All matches will be played from the White tees over 18 holes with the exception of the Rabbits Lumb Trophy which will be played from Yellow tees over 18 holes. The Ingham and Holroyd Bowl individual finals will be over 36 holes, preferably played on the same day, but by agreement with both players it may be over two dates, as long as the deadline is met. The Rabbits Lumb Trophy and the David Thomas Tigers Trophy individual finals will be played over 18 holes.
- b) Matches must begin from the 1st tee
- c) Matches are "Match Play" format according to R & A Rules
- d) The match should commence at the date and time agreed by both players. In the event that one player may be late for the tie, he must notify his opponent. A player that is late, apart from exceptional circumstances, within the first five minutes of the original tee time, who has not made contact will concede the first hole. After a further five minutes the player who is late is disqualified.
- e) In individual matches, full Course Handicap difference is calculated. In the Dyson Smith Foursomes the difference is half combined Course Handicap. In Centenary Greensomes the calculator grid is used to determine the difference in shots.
- f) All matches, apart from Individual Finals for the Holroyd Bowl and Ingham Bowl, are played over 18 holes. Once play has commenced the match should be completed. Where a match ends 'All Square' after 18 holes the match should continue until one player/team wins a hole. The match will continue from the 1st tee and strokes will be given as in the stipulated round except where both players/teams agree to discontinue in accordance with Rule 5.7a or one player/team considers the light too bad to continue for Health & Safety reasons.
- g) After discontinuation of a tie, players will resume the stipulated round from the last completed hole when the match was abandoned with the score remaining the same, at a time and date to suit both players/teams
- h) Matches can be conceded before or during the match
- Matches cannot be resolved under any other forms of golf e.g "best nett score at the weekend".
 Knockouts are matchplay, not strokeplay
- j) Matches cannot be resolved by the toss of a coin
- k) Players may make reasonable requests to the Competition Secretary, who in turn will discuss the request with the Club Committee
- I) Any dispute must be referred to the Competition Secretary as soon as possible

8) Pace of Play

- a) A 3 ball match should complete their round in 3 hours 40 minutes. Players who take more than 4 hours to complete their round may be penalized in accordance with 'The Pace of Play' and after consideration by the Competition Secretary and 2 other members of the Committee.
- b) For the purpose of preventing slow play, the Competition Secretary or Members of the Competition Committee may, in the conditions of a competition, establish pace of play guidelines including maximum periods of time allowed to complete a stipulated round, a hole or a stroke.
- c) In Match play, the Competition Secretary and Members of the Committee may, in such a condition, modify the penalty for a breach of this Rule as follows:

First offence - Loss of hole
Second offence - Loss of hole
Subsequent offence - Disqualification

d) In Strokeplay, the Competition Secretary and Members of the Committee may, in such acondition, modify the penalty for a breach of this Rule as follows:

First offence - One stroke
Second offence - Two Strokes
For subsequent offence - Disqualification

9) Suspension of Play/Inclement Weather

- a) Until play is suspended, it is the Competitor's responsibility to attempt to complete each hole whilst there may be deterioration in the weather. Every effort must be made to hole out on each green. Standing water may be removed by the use of the provided squeegees.
- b) If the Club Professional, the Competition Secretary, a Member of the Committee, or a Member of the Committee organising the competition on the day, believes there is a risk to life at any point while players are on the course the claxon will sound continuously which means all play is to be suspended immediately.
- c) The player/s should mark the position of the ball and immediately leave the golf course. It is recommended all players make their way into the clubhouse where further instructions regarding the resumption of play will be communicated to all players.
- d) Failure to comply will be considered a serious breach of responsibility by the player/s and could consequently lead to serious implications from the Elland Golf Club Committee.
- e) If the Club Professional, the Competition Secretary, a Member of the Committee or a Member of the Committee organising the Competition of the day considers that for any reason the course is not in a playable condition, or that there are circumstances that render the proper playing of the game impossible, they may sound the claxon in three prolonged bursts for example: fog, flooded greens, wind etc. This indicates a temporary suspension to play.
- f) The player/s should mark the position of the ball and immediately leave the golf course. It is recommended all players make their way into the clubhouse where further instructions regarding the resumption of play will be communicated to all players.
- g) Failure to comply will be considered a serious breach of responsibility by the player/s and could consequently lead to serious implications from the Elland Golf Club Committee.
- h) If the Competition Committee decides that the course has become fit to play again within a time agreed by the Members organising the competition of the day, then play shall be restarted by two short burst of the claxon.

- If the Committee decides that the conditions have not improved within the time agreed by the organising Committee then play shall be abandoned for the day and the Committee will inform Competitors of the outcome.
- j) Competition Policy- The Competition Committee has the right to decide whether a competition should stand based on a number of factors:
 - j.i) Have the majority of players completed their rounds?
 - j.ii) Is it fair to call a result based on the conditions in question?
 - j.iii) Is it viable to re-organise the Competition?
- k) During a multi-round Competition the Committee may decide to call a result on a reduced number of holes played and will decide on a case by case policy.
- I) The Competition Committee who decide on an Inclement Weather Policy shall consist of two people from the following list:
 - (l.i.1.a) The Competition Secretary
 - (l.i.1.b) The Club Professional
 - (l.i.1.c) The GreenKeeper
 - (I.i.1.d) The Captain, The Lady Captain
 - (l.i.1.e) The Vice Captain, The Lady Vice Captain
 - (l.i.1.f) The Honorary Secretary, The Ladies Secretary
 - (l.i.1.g) Members of the Main Committee
 - (l.i.1.h) In the absence of all above Past Captains and Presidents
- m) Any representative from the list who actively takes part in the Competition in question shall not be eligible to represent the Competition Committee for the event in question.
- n) The Committee's decision will be final.
- o) Claxon's- The Claxons will be located:
 - (o.i.1.a) In the Professional's shop
 - (o.i.1.b) In the Greenkeeper's building
 - (o.i.1.c) In the office
 - (o.i.1.d) Behind the Bar

10) Course Maintenance/New Hole

Competitors must accept the condition of the course as they find it and may not suspend play because of green keeping work being carried out during their round. This includes the cutting of greens and new holes.

11) Practice

Practice is allowed on Stroke Play Competition days on the putting green and in the practice net only. Practice is allowed on the Course in a Match Play Format as defined in the Rules of Golf.

12) Tied Competitions

a) Ties in stroke play competitions will be decided on the best card over the inward half, the last 9, 6, 3, or last hole, Handicaps will be applied proportionately. If this does not provide a clear winner, the last 12 and 15 holes will be similarly used to decide. Where a competition is played over 15 holes the best score over the last 7, 6, 3 holes or last hole will be used to decide.

- b) Ties in the Winter League will be decided by a match play playoff. The tied Competitors whether Tiger or Rabbit will be drawn with a Tiger or Rabbit that has participated within the competition and played in at least 4 out of the 6 rounds of matches. The play off will be arranged within 2 weeks of the playing of the final Winter League. In the event of a further tie sudden death will be used to decide the result.
- c) Ties in overall Casson Cup or Chesswas Salver competitions will be decided based on the last qualifying round score.
- d) Ties in the Order of Merit will be decided based on number of 10 pts scores awarded. If these are identical then number of 9 pts scores awarded and so on.

13) Handicaps

- a) For all competitions managed via the ClubV1 computer system its the Committee's responsibility to calculate the players Course and Playing Handicap. It is the individual players responsibility to ensure that they play off the correct handicap in any competition/knockout not controlled by the Clubv1 computer system. In this instance the player is responsible for calculating their Course Handicap from the Course Handicap Tables provided on the Clubhouse exterior wall in the Car Park/Elland Golf Club website and their Playing Handicap based on the format of the competition and Handicap allowances defined in the Rules of Handicapping, Appendix C and Section I below.
- b) Adjustments to handicaps will be made in accordance with the WHS® Rules of Handicapping.
- c) All individual Strokeplay Competitions played between March and October over the measured course will be Qualifying Competitions.
- d) All Qualifying scores must be entered correctly using the PSI or MSI by each Competitor as soon as possible after completion of their round. Ideally this should be immediately after the round but should be no later than 1 hour after completing the round.
- e) All Scorecards for qualifying competitions must be posted into the scorecard returns box.
- f) A member obtains a handicap by presenting a handicap certificate from another club or by posting three cards signed by another member into the scorecard returns box. Evidence of a reasonable standard of golf is expected prior to being given a handicap.
- g) Members with prior golfing experience are expected to inform the Competition/Handicap Secretary of this prior to being allocated a handicap. New members should present a handicap certificate.
- h) The update of the handicaps of players, is now completed daily under the WHS® at 02:00 including all scores entered from the previous day and is not dependant on the competition being closed. The Competitions Secretary will however endeavour to close the competitions as soon as possible on the day of the competition and post the results in the locker room, also on Howdidido at https://www.howdidido.com and the Club Systems V1 Members app so that members have every opportunity to ensure they are aware of their current handicap prior to playing any competition on the following day.
- i) All Competitors who begin play in any singles qualifying stroke play competition will be subject to handicap revision.
- j) The WHS® Rules of Handicapping will be adhered to as regards adjustment of handicaps.
- k) The Handicap Committee will carry out a review of handicaps annually, normally in January under Section 7.1a of WHS® Rules of Handicapping.
- I) Handicap allowances for match play competitions will be applied to the Course Handicap:

- I.i) Singles Full Difference between the Course Handicaps of the players
- I.ii) Fourball Betterball 90% Handicap Allowance applied to all players Course Handicaps. The player with the lowest Playing Handicap plays off zero strokes relative to the other players.
- I.iii) Foursomes Team Playing Handicap = 50 % of the combined Course Handicaps of the two players in the team. The team with the lowest Playing Handicap plays off zero strokes relative to the other team.
- I.iv) Stableford Single Matchplay Full handicap with strokes deducted at each hole to the Stroke Index of the course.
- l.v) Fourball Match Play 90% Handicap Allowance applied to all players Course Handicaps. The player with the lowest Playing Handicap plays off zero strokes relative to the other players.
- I.vi)Winter League Betterball Matchplay. 90% Handicap Allowance applied to all players Course Handicaps. The player with the lowest Playing Handicap plays off zero strokes relative to the other players.
- I.vii) Greensomes Lower handicap x 0.6 plus higher handicap x 0.4. Greensomes handicap allowance table is displayed on notice board.

14) Officials

The Competition Secretary, the Club Professional or a member of the Committee will endeavour to be present for the official start of any Competition and is empowered to decide on any problems which may arise such as, starting times, provision of markers and handicaps.

15) Closing the Course

The Greenkeeper/Club Professional is empowered by the Committee to close the course where weather conditions or Health and Safety issues require. When the Greenkeeper is not present the Greens Chairman will take responsibility for this issue. Should neither the Greenkeeper nor the Greens Chairman be present any member of the Committee will take responsibility.

16) Decision on the Rules

- a) Only the Competition Secretary or a member of the Committee may give a decision on a rule matter.
- b) In Competitions of more than one round, Competitors must obtain a decision on any rules or doubt arising from the previous round from the Competition Secretary or member of the Committee before playing a subsequent round.
- c) The Committee will where there is no clear precedent in the 'Decisions on the Rules of Golf' or competition rules obtain guidance from appropriate sources.

17) Score Cards and Stroke Index

The responsibilities of the Committee, Marker (who is normally a fellow Competitor) and Competitor are as follows:

Committee

- a) To Maintain the Stroke index table.
- b) To check all Competitors submitted cards for accuracy.
- c) To provide each Competitor entered into an Open Competition with a scorecard showing the date of the Competition, the Competitors name and handicap provided by the Competitor.

Note:

a) A Competitor will not be penalized for returning a wrongly totalled scorecard where they have recorded the correct score at each hole or have wrongly subtracted the correct handicap from which they are entitled to play.

- b) In Stableford Competitions, it is the Committee's responsibility to compute the points scored at each hole.
- c) In a Bogey Competition a Competitor cannot be penalized for showing a wrong result against a hole for which they have correctly recorded their score.

Marker

- a) To check the score with the Competitor for each hole, including any penalty strokes.
- b) To record the gross score taken by the Competitor for each hole (preferably as soon as the hole is completed).
- c) To sign the scorecard and hand it to the Competitor on completion of the round.

Competitor

- a) In Club Competitions the Competitor must ensure they are issued with a scorecard from the Club Professional with their name from the organising member of the Committee. In the absence of the Club Professional or the organising member of the Committee, the Competitor is required to complete a scorecard themselves detailing their Name, Date of Competition, Name of Competition, Tee Time.
- b) To check his score for each hole.
- c) To settle any doubtful scores with the Competition Secretary prior to handing in the card or where it's not possible providing a note of the problem with the scorecard when placing the card in the returns.
- d) To ensure that they and their marker have signed the card and that the card is returned into the scorecard returns box prior to leaving the Club Property.
- e) In a Fourball stroke play Competition to ensure that the gross score which counts is correctly recorded on the card.
- f) Before starting a match in a handicap Competition both Competitors should ascertain the Course Handicap and Playing Handicap after application of any relevant Handicap Allowances of their opponent.

Note:

- a.i) It is immaterial where the card is checked.
- a.ii)The fact that the Marker/Competitor have signed the card will be an indication that the card has been checked in accordance with the rules.
- a.iii) Should the card be signed in the wrong place this will not invalidate the card.
- g) The Competitor is liable for disqualification for any breach of Rule 3.3b(2), the wording of which is designed to impress upon the Competitor their responsibility for ensuring the correctness of the card they return properly singed and countersigned.
- h) The Committee have the power to waive or modify a penalty of disqualification, but this power may only be used in exceptional circumstances and should not be used in cases where the Competitor has been careless or negligent.
- i) The Competitor's duty to return their card 'as soon as possible' should be interpreted reasonably. Since no alterations may be made after the card has been returned the Competitor must be allowed sufficient time to check their card carefully. It is the responsibility of the Committee to decide whether any delay in returning the card was reasonable or not.

18) Returning Scorecard and Computer Input

- a) A Competitor's score must be entered into the computer without delay and within a reasonable time after completion of their rounds. A 'reasonable time' is deemed to be within 1 hour of completing their round. Any Competitors deemed to have taken unduly taken too long to enter their score, resulting in the Competition being unable to be finalised and shut down will be disqualified from that competition.
- b) On completion of entering the score into the computer, it is the player's responsibility to post the scorecard in to the scorecard returns box. Once that scorecard has been placed in the box then that card is deemed to have been returned.
- c) A Competitor must not return their scorecard in the scorecard return box unless that score has been entered into the computer. If a card is returned prior to a score input then that player may be disqualified.
- d) Once a scorecard has been entered into the computer, the scorecard must then be placed into the scorecard returns box. Any player entering a score into the computer and then not returning the scorecard in the returns box may be disqualified.
- e) Once a scorecard has been entered and is placed in the scorecard returns box then that signifies the player has duly completed their round. The scorecard will not be returned to the player for alteration or signing. Any unsigned cards returned in the Scorecard Returns Box will be disqualified.
- f) A scorecard will be returned to a player after it has been returned, for settling any dispute or for clarification only. The scorecard cannot be altered in any form.
- g) The club shall ensure, at the conclusion of each round of qualifying competitions, all scorecards will be checked thoroughly for handicap purposes and the competition is finalised as soon as practicably possible. This may not be on the day of competition unless a result is required for a ceremony or presentation dinner.

19) No Returns

A Competitor entering their score into the computer must enter a score for each hole completed in a competition. If a hole is not completed within the Competition a '0' must be entered relating to the hole not completed. If the Competitor withdraws and leaves the course immediately then subsequently a set of '0's will be entered into the computer for the remaining holes not played or completed and the Did Not Play (DNP) indicator set for these holes. If a Competitor continues the competition then a score must be entered for every remaining hole completed. It will not be accepted that a full set '0's be entered into the computer for the remaining holes played. The Competition Secretary after consultation with the offending player may impose a suspension of play for one competition.

20) Serious Breach of Rules

Any serious and continued breach of Etiquette, the Rules of Golf or Rules of Competition on the course, clubhouse or within the boundaries of the club property, the Competition Secretary/the Main Committee will, after consultation with the player/players impose a playing ban to their discretion ranging from 2-4 major club competitions. The decision of the Competition Secretary/Main Committee will be final.

21) Ladies Section

a) Each Thursday is the main Competition day of the Ladies Section of Elland Golf Club and as such, the Ladies Section have reserved tee times and have precedence on the course between 9 am and 3.30 pm. Winter League

- 1. The format of Winter League is 4BBB Matchplay played over 18 holes. If match is tied after 18 holes no further holes are played and result will stand as a drawn match. Ideally a Tiger (HI 0- 14.9) with be paired with Rabbit (HI 15.0 54).
- 2. 6 Winter League Competitions will scheduled with 6 alternative dates for these fixture should the weather intervene. Only 5 results count from the 6 competitions and the worst result from 6 will be dropped (this includes both the points scored and holes up/down score).
- 3. Scoring is as follows:-
 - 3 points for a win, 2 points for draw & 1 point for a loss/turning up
- 4. All matches must be played until a result is confirmed and matches should not be conceded early as holes up/down could have a bearing on the overall Competition results.
- 5. In the event of tie after the 6 competitions, holes up/down will be used to decide winners/runners up. If results are still tied the Winter League will be decided by a match play playoff. The tied Competitors whether Tiger or Rabbit will be drawn with a Tiger or Rabbit that has participated within the competition and played in at least 4 out of the 6 rounds of matches. The play off will be arranged within 2 weeks of the playing of the final Winter League. In the event of a further tie after 18 holes og match play playoff, sudden death will be used to decide the result.
- 6. 90% Handicap Allowance applied to all players Course Handicaps. The player with the lowest Playing Handicap plays off zero strokes relative to the other players. i.e.

•	Player A CH 12	PH 10	Plays off scratch
•	Player B CH 15	PH 13	gets 3 shots (Holes with SI1 – 3)
•	Player C CH 20	PH 18	gets 8 shots (Holes with SI 1-8)
	Plaver D CH 26	PH 23	gets 13 shots (Holes with SI 1 – 13)

7. Winter Rules of Golf should be adhered when these are in play. i.e. Fairway Mats to be used on fairways only and not in the rough. If the course and weather conditions have not allowed the Greens staff to effectively define the fairways then the Winter League Coordinator will communicate on the day that Fairway Mats will be used in all areas of the course except in the Trees/Copse.

- 8. If Winter Greens are in use then players must hole out for the score to count. '2 putt rule' should not be used on Winter Greens for this Board competition.
- 9. Where numbers of players registered for that days Winter League Competition does not allow for all players to be paired up, Calculta Format will be used when there are three players. 90% Handicap Allowance for all players still applies with shots been taken from the low man.
 - Each hole has 6 points up for grabs. The player with the best nett score receives 4 points, the 2nd best will receive 2 points and the 3rd player receives 0 points (4 2 0).
 - If two players tie for the best nett score, they receive 3 points each, the third player 0 (3 3 0). If two players tie for second best nett score, points are allocated in a 4 1 1 fashion.
 - Points can be recalibrated in such a way to make it easier to remember the score. For example, if the scores are 12 8 6 after 4 holes say, this is the equivalent of 6 2 0. Or 10 8 8 reduces to 2 0 0.
 - The match will continue until all 3 places are decided. I.e. If after 17 holes the score is Player A=17pts, Player B=8pts and Player C=0 pts then Player B can't catch Player A and Player C can't catch Player B.
 - Player A gets 3 pts for win, Player B 2 pts for draw and Player C 1 pt for loss
 - As Player A beat Player C by 17 points and as 4 pts equates to a hole won then Player A would get 4 holes up and Player C would get 4 holes down. Player B 0 Holes up or down for draw.
