Since the last newsletter much has changed.

The Club successfully planned and managed the return to golf. To compliment this, albeit a little later, we were able to re-open the Clubhouse and the bar and catering operation and it was imperative that the Clubhouse was as COVID secure as possible for staff, members and visitors alike. The measures introduced have been comprehensive and detailed – all in compliance with the Government's guidelines and if you ventured up to the bar you would have seen the many efforts and processes that have been put into place to facilitate this and to ensure safety for all as far as is possible.

The House staff has worked very hard since re-opening to maintain the integrity of the Clubhouse ensuring a safe environment for us all. It was decided to progress with the re-opening as a phased approach taking a number of factors into account. It was important to keep our staff safe and to this end the bar and catering team were spilt into two teams of three to ensure they never worked together to ensure that we would not lose the whole team if someone was to become ill or show symptoms.



One team opened up initially just the bar with limited opening hours. As time progressed, we were able to open the bar on a full time basis welcoming back all the bar staff still split into to two teams and, in addition, a limited food offering was also available.

The next phase was the reopening of the kitchen on limited days where we able to bring back the kitchen staff. Special Friday food nights (including a take away service) were introduced as were Sunday lunches and a revised day menuall of which were very well received by the members

Needless to say, navigating the Club through the difficult times so far has entailed the General Manager and the House Manager making critical decisions, supported by the House Committee and the Management Committee, to provide a service to members in the best manner possible under the circumstances. It has been heartening to see thus far how many members have been very supportive of their Club.

The second lockdown at the beginning of November came as a shock for us all. The course was closed as was the Clubhouse.
