EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

At my AGM address this year I provided a status of the work we have done on changing our Management Structure and on Strategy development.

As many of you did not attend the meeting and have probably not read the minutes on ClubV1 I thought I would reiterate <u>some</u> of that address here to hopefully a wider audience, so my apologies for some of you who may have already seen some of the words.

The Revised Organisation is based on recommendations stemming from a Strategic review completed in 2016 and also on recommendations from a comprehensive paper produced by The GCMA and other organisations which helped us to draft role descriptions for the key management positions and Terms of reference for our management committees.

It has 5 Prime Objectives

- To create an Executive Committee and sub-committees that are more strategic and less operational in their discussions and decisions.
- Reduce the size of the volunteer management group to facilitate more agile decision making
- 3. Improve continuity across successive administrations by providing documented and clear Processes, Role Description and Terms of Reference.
- Reduce the burden of responsibility of the Captain and spread workload across

- committee members
- To maximise potential for growth by providing clear direction to the General Manager who has delegated responsibility for all Operational Management

Conceptually the Executive Committee, in a similar manner to a Board is charged with overall Governance of the Club and Strategy Development, whilst having oversight of Operational matters. The day to day Operation is delegated to the Role of 'General Manager' (who is an employee reporting and working with the Executive). He is assisted by three Operational Committees who work with him and other key employees, to ensure member involvement.

Two of the Operational Committees you are familiar with, those of Course and House. A New Committee under Chair of the Captain deals with all Golfing, Social and Membership matters.

A second New Committee has also been established called the Nominations committee, this committee endeavours to find and encourage members who wish join the Management Structure to try and ensure we have a balance of skills, gender and age, plus develop a succession plan for key roles.

As a result of the work carried out over the last three years, for the first time ever we have a documented Governance system which can enable continuity from one administration to another and give changing

personnel a head start on being able to contribute.

An Organisation Diagram is now posted on V1 which summarises the responsibilities of each of the committees in the Management Structure.

Reviewing the organisations performance and recommending change is now an integral part of the Executive Management process.

We are developing strategies on a number of topics and so far we have developed strategies for Course and House and have implemented and are implementing elements of both. The Open Forum which I announced at the AGM was well received by those that attended and we are now embarking on the first tranche of the changes identified there.

One other strategic topic is Communication. The Course reports created by our Course Manager Kevin Hensman provides a good insight into the issues and actions taken to ensure our prime asset is maintained at a high level of quality.

This Magazine has been reintroduced as a means of providing information on all the other topics that may be of interest to you as members.

We will also be looking at how we use our Website, ClubV1. Twitter and physical noticeboards to provide a coordinated

dissemination of information that is necessary and sufficient.

I do not intend to expand any further here on our strategic intentions however it is our intent to post a summary of them on the Website or ClubV1 later this year and provide you with an opportunity to participate in the future development of the Club.

We are financially in a strong position however as you are all aware the future looks challenging. I do believe however that we have a management structure that as it matures will provide a strong basis for decision making and a set of strategies that will inform us in the difficult decisions and priorities we may need to make as we head into next year.

In the meantime, enjoy your golf, enjoy the clubhouse and may it only rain at night.

SPECIAL PROJECTS COMMITTEE

Over the years a little-known Committee called the 'The Special Projects Committee' has run events to raise funds and identify and manage 'Projects' that were not part of our mainstream budgets.

The pandemic saw the curtailing of many of the fundraising events and the most recent committee members have decided that they wish to 'retire' from the committee. As a result, the Committee has ceased to operate.

I thought that it was appropriate therefore to take this moment to recognise the efforts of the various members and their achievements. As you will see over the years the committee has consisted of many Past Captains, Ladies Captains and Presidents and the projects and funds raised not trivial. With the help of Tony Cose, Geoff Witte, Brian French and Keith Fisher, below is a brief history.

In 1993 the Club set up a Centenary Fundraising Committee under the Chair, Steve Hoar, and consisting of Stevie Denby, Ken Watherston and Brian Kilby. They were set the task of raising funds for the upcoming Club Centenary in 2002.

During the next decade almost £120,000 was raised from a variety of events including three "open" golfing events for men, ladies and mixed teams, a 200 Club, business golf days, opens, quizzes, Nostalgia nights, and various raffles. In 2002 there was a £5,000 donation from the Club.

In 1997 a Centenary Steering Committee was set up to determine what projects and events would be carried out in the Centenary year. Following a questionnaire to the members the following events were funded: New entrance gates and lights, the water feature on the 18th, one of 2 'Swilkin' bridges (the second bridge was paid for by Tony Leach), and new "centenary" trophies. One project in which Sheila Reeves was heavily involved was the Centenary Dinner and Ball, held in a marquee on the side of the 10th fairway and attended by almost 500 members.

Following the 2002 celebrations there was a small amount of money un-spent and the Captain Peter Harrison decided to continue, with the now 'Special Projects' Committee to spend the remaining funds and to raise funds for future projects. The committee's mandate was

to raise funds but only from outside sources and identify suitable projects. It was accordingly agreed to continue with the three fund raising "open" golfing events.

In 2008 the Special Projects Committee terms of reference were re-established by myself with a specific project brief being, to extend the previously small balcony.

For the past 20 years, since 2002, a considerable amount of money has been raised and spent on a variety of projects under the successive chairmanships of Tony Cose, Jim Grieve and Nigel Jurd.

Projects that have been successfully completed include the aforementioned balcony extension, new honours boards, on course toilets, trophy cabinet and the improved practice ground facilities.

The other members who, over the years, were instrumental in running the highly successful golfing events and/or implementing the projects include Geoff Witte, Brian French, Ken Watherston, Jim Thatcher, Alan Roff, Val Webb, Pat Meech and Jim Humphreys.

The running of each open event required much support on the day particularly 'signing in' and in the latter years teams including Di Cose, Betty Deal, Linda Grennan, Liz Humphreys, Pat Toothill and Penny Witte carried out this task.

There are many other members who volunteer their time to the Club in other ways, however I thought as this particular Committee had reached the end of its existence, it was a way of drawing to members attention the importance of such activities for the life and development of the Club.

What Next.....


There are a number of initiatives that we will be focusing on over the coming months to bring the section up to the standard that we would like to achieve at RCGC. A few examples are:
